

## **The Colombia Aid Package By the Numbers**

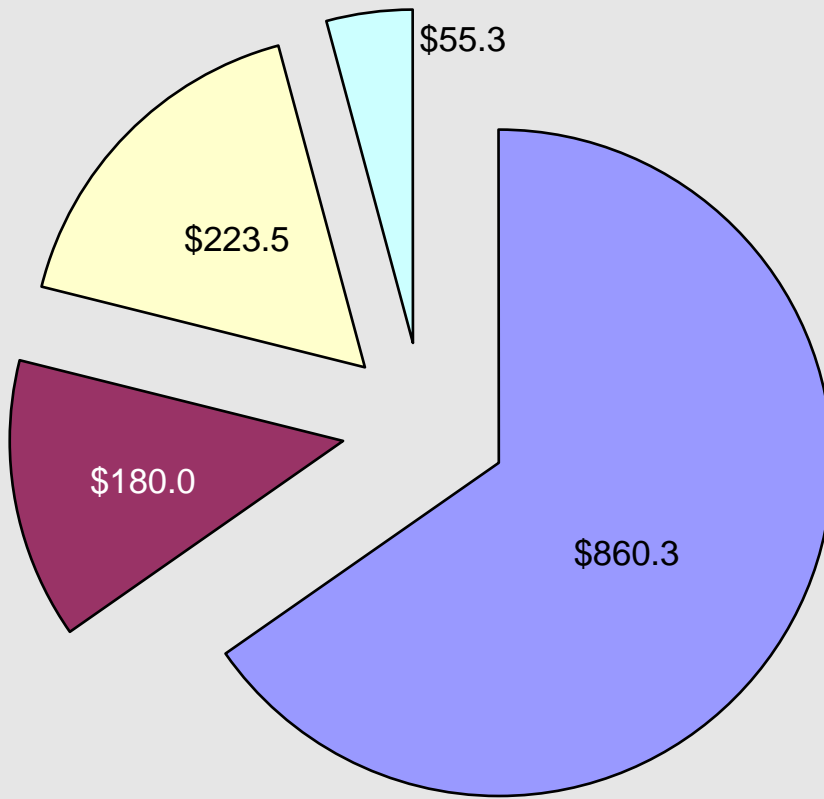
### **I. Colombia's share of the supplemental assistance:**

The \$1.319 billion "Colombia" aid package, which Congress approved on June 30, 2000, also includes funding for other Andean countries and for U.S. agencies involved in drug interdiction and law enforcement.

About \$ 860.3 million of that -- 65 percent -- would go to assist Colombia's government and security forces. Colombia is to get \$ 330 million in assistance that was already planned for 2000 and 2001, so the total for Colombia over two years would be \$ 1.190 billion (including both military and economic aid).

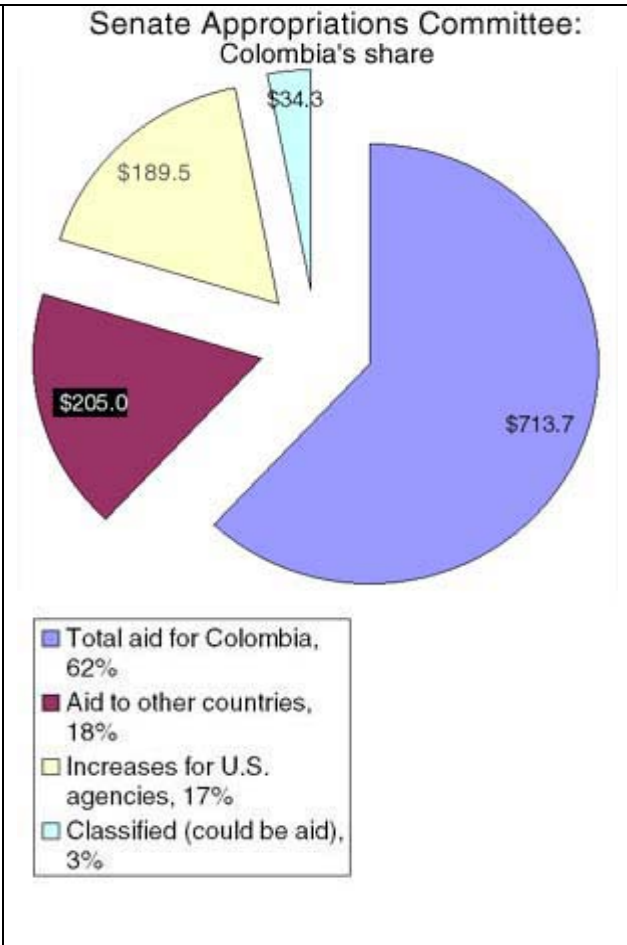
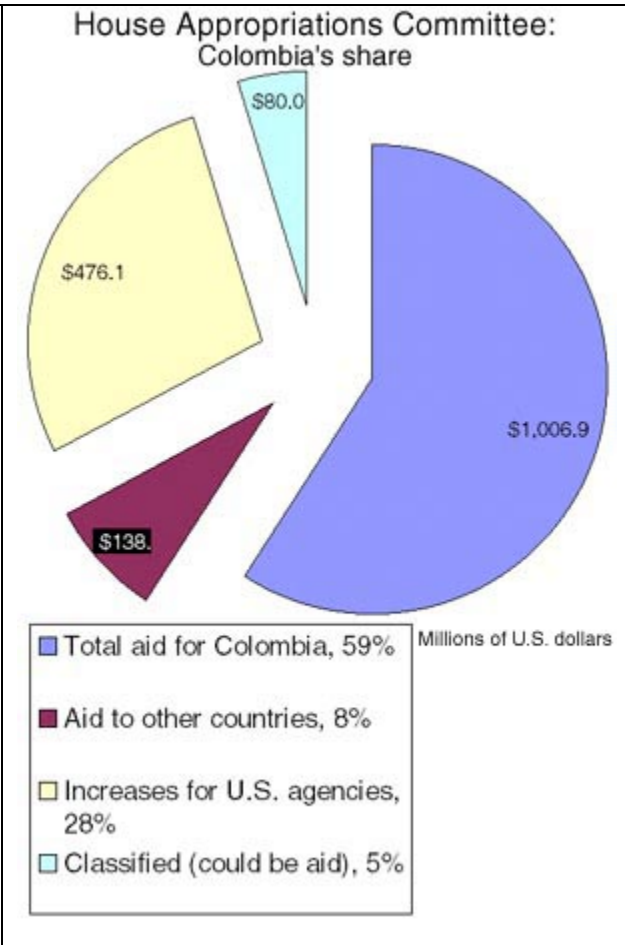
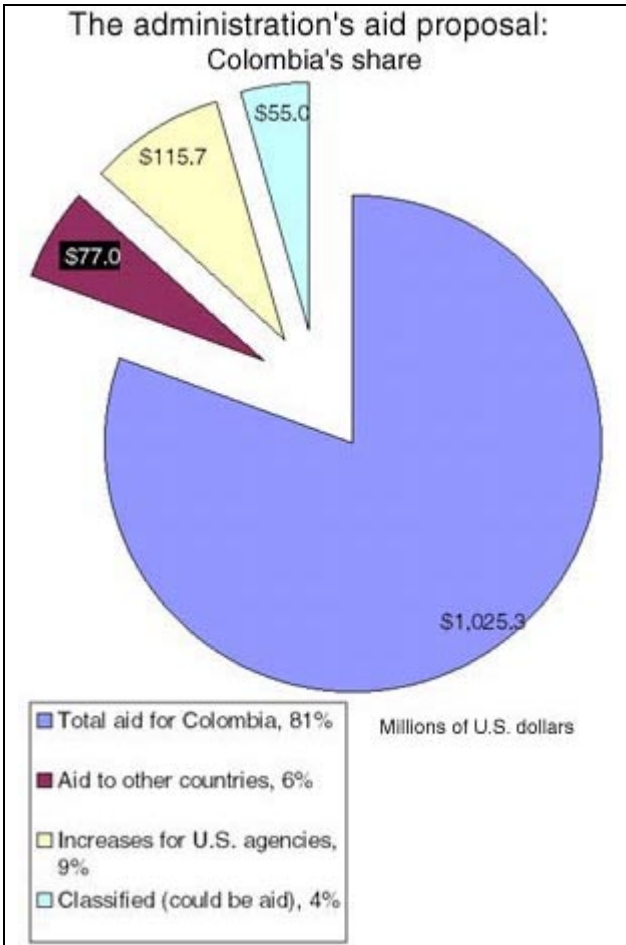

## II. Breakdown of the Colombia aid:

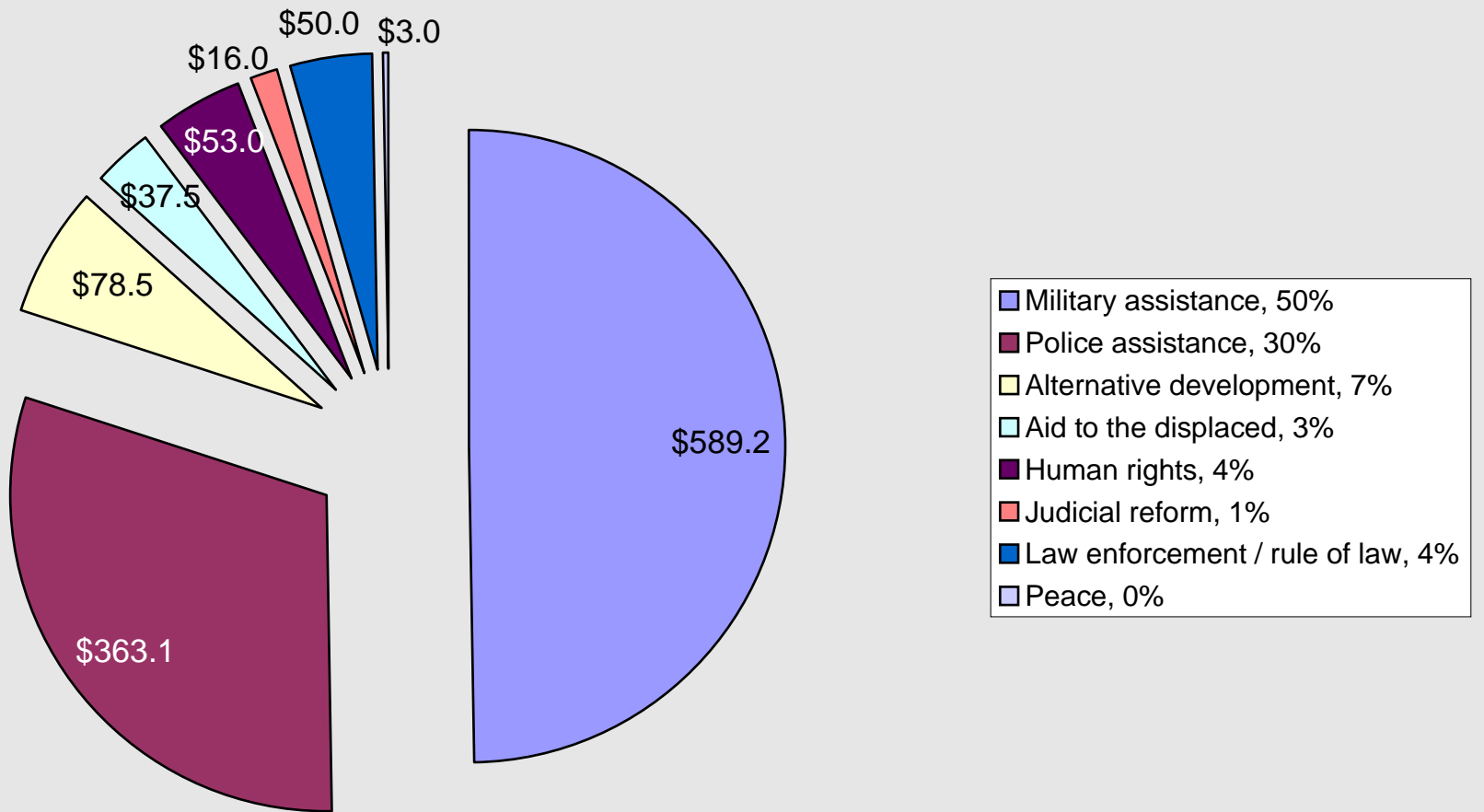
The final version of the aid package provides 80% military/police aid and 20% economic aid, a ratio very similar to the Clinton Administration's original proposal. (Without the \$330 million in previously planned assistance, the package provides 75% military/police aid and 25% economic aid.)

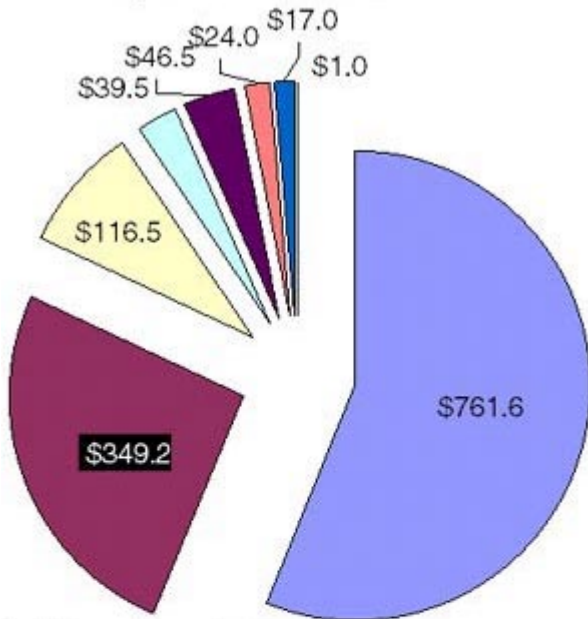

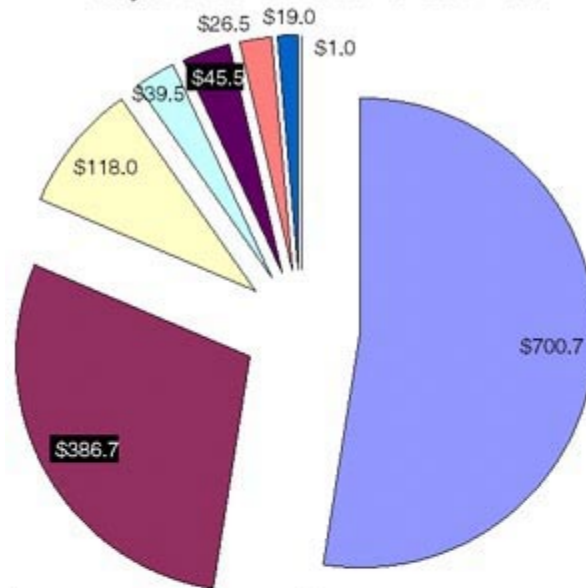

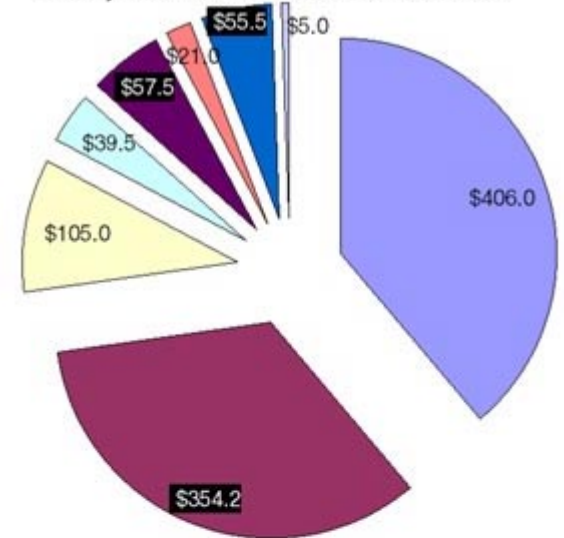
**House Appropriations Committee:
